BRIBING A JUROR Penal Law § 215.19 (Committed on or after Nov. 1, 1985)

The (specify) count is Bribing a Juror.

Under our law, a person is guilty of Bribing a Juror when he or she confers, or offers or agrees to confer, any benefit upon a juror upon an agreement or understanding that such juror's vote, opinion, judgment, decision or other action as a juror will thereby be influenced.

The following terms used in that definition have a special meaning:

BENEFIT means any gain or advantage to the beneficiary and includes any gain or advantage to a third person pursuant to the desire or consent of the beneficiary.¹

JUROR means any person who is a member of any jury, including a grand jury, impaneled by any court in this state or by any public servant authorized by law to empanel a jury. [The term juror also includes a person who has been drawn or summoned to attend as a prospective juror.] ²

AGREEMENT means a mutual agreement between a juror and a person who confers, or offers or agrees to confer, any benefit upon such juror, that such juror's vote, opinion, judgment, decision or other action as a juror will thereby be influenced.³

UNDERSTANDING means at least a unilateral perception or belief by a person who confers, or offers or agrees to confer, any benefit upon a juror that the juror's vote, opinion, judgment,

decision or other action as a juror will thereby be influenced by the conferring of, the offering of, or the agreeing to confer any benefit upon that juror.⁴

In order for you to find the defendant guilty of this crime, the People are required to prove, from all the evidence in the case, beyond a reasonable doubt, each of the following three elements:

- 1. That on or about <u>(date)</u>, <u>(specify)</u> was a juror;
- 2. That on that date, in the county of <u>(county)</u>, the defendant, <u>(defendant's name)</u>, conferred, or offered or agreed to confer, a benefit upon him/her; and
- 3. That the defendant did so upon an agreement or understanding that <u>(specify's)</u> vote, opinion, judgment, decision or other action as a juror would thereby be influenced.

If you find the People have proven beyond a reasonable doubt each of those elements, you must find the defendant guilty of this crime.

If you find the People have not proven beyond a reasonable doubt any one or more of those elements, you must find the defendant not guilty of this crime.
